The Impact of Your Gift

Gifts to the Parent and Family Fund allowed University Life to implement a number of innovative opportunities to keep students safely involved in the Mason community and to provide key resources aimed at prioritizing student health and well-being during the ongoing pandemic.

Alternative Break Program

Social Action and Integrative Learning (SAIL) leads Mason's Alternative Break program where students partner with host organizations to work toward community-driven goals that address social issues through education and community service. Select students serve as trip leaders and work with Mason faculty and staff to design and organize an experience for their peers. Students emerge from these experiences with new ideas and perspectives that inspire active and engaged citizenship. SAIL provided eight scholarships to students serving as trip leaders, including Blythe, who organized an alternative break program focused on HIV and AIDS.



I chose to become a trip leader after being a participant on the HIV and AIDS Alternative Break last year. I attribute this experience, both attending and planning the trip, to my current successes and passions related to substance use and harm reduction. Leading this trip has been one of the best things I have done so far in my college career. Planning an experience that will hopefully destigmatize not only HIV and AIDS, but also substance use and sexual orientation [for student participants] has been a project of passion and purpose.

Unpaid Internship Scholarships

The ongoing impacts of the pandemic forced many financially disadvantaged students to choose between pursuing a valuable, resume-building unpaid internship or keeping a job unrelated to their career goals to pay the bills. University Career Services provided seven scholarships to students completing unpaid internships at area organizations such as the American Red Cross.



Bystander Intervention Training

Whether in the classroom, a social setting, a registered student organization, or just with their peers, students may find themselves in situations that require bystander intervention skills to promote safety, support, empathy, and community building. The Student Support and Advocacy Center hosted bystander intervention training to help students develop the skills to safely intervene in a situation and to challenge the Mason community to choose intervention and prioritize well-being for all.



Graduate Outdoor Adventures

Opportunities to build a sense of community during this time of social and physical distancing are more important now than ever. Graduate Student Life, in partnership with Outdoor Adventures, offered a series of trips for students where they could hike, climb, bike, canoe, or paddleboard, while forming relationships with their peers across disciplines. Funding was used to subsidize the trips so the cost would not limit student participation.
